- A brief (up to 4 pages) CV of the candidate, and;
- A list of the candidate's authored papers.

Submit the nomination as a **single .pdf file** in the following order: (1) cover sheet, (2) nomination letter, (3) letter of support, (4) CV and (5) authored papers.

Submit the completed form on the GS website.

Please keep this nomination **anonymous**. Often the award recipient asks to know and to acknowledge those involved in the nomination process, check this box if you **NOT** want GS to share this information with the recipient.
